







It is not uncommon to find me part way through 3-5 books at a time. It is a life skill I picked up through the demands of higher education, I can read several books at a time. I know that sentence is making some of you cringe! Here are three I am reading right now and why I am reading them.




Blessed are the Crazy by Sarah Griffith Lund This book is the testimony of a fellow clergywoman who grew up with mental illness in her family. I am just one chapter in, but my understanding is that she will help church leaders find tangible ways to talk about mental illness in the church. Churches have not been good at talking about mental health and mental illness and she sees tangible ways to change this. This is currently the book I leave in my study at the church and I read it in the hope of gaining new insight into being a pastor in today's world.



Holy Envy, Finding God in the Faith of Others by Barbara Brown Taylor Let me start with, if you haven't read any of Barbara Brown Taylor's work you are missing out. She is an Episcopal priest who teaches Religion 101 in a small town in Georgia. She is also a phenomenal speaker who I have had the privilege to hear on multiple occasions. I am reading this book for a Pastor Book Study group I meet with on Tuesday afternoons. In Holy Envy, Taylor recounts her own story of finding beauty in other faith traditions. I am having a terrible time putting this one down as we read one chapter per week!



1&2 Samuel in The Bible It may seem odd to list The Bible as on my reading list because I am a pastor after all! I read one chapter every morning, slowly and intentionally. Sometimes I need to read them two or three times because the stories leave me with plenty to chew on. I am currently reading them in CEB (Common English Bible) translation which is fairly new in the world of translations. I love this translation because it stays true to the original Greek and Hebrew but uses language common to our time. I invite you to do the same this summer, choose one or two books of the Bible and give them a close reading. I highly recommend doing this with stories we know by heart, there are often parts we leave out or forget about. For example, the book of Genesis has two separate creation stories in Chapters 1 & 2, we often combine them when we talk about them. The story of Noah doesn't end with the rainbow and dove, it takes a dark turn. The beautiful story of Abraham and Sarah has an ugly underside in Hagar and Ishmael being turned out.



Bonus: *I'm Judging You:* A Do Better Manual by Luvvie Ajayi I just finished reading this one for fun. Before I go any further, I will warn you Ajayi is very straightforward and names things with honesty that are sometimes hard to hear. She also occasionally uses strong language, as in not suitable for church. However, she is a powerful storyteller and takes on how we act, especially on social media, with humor, honesty, and some hard to swallow truths. I found it to be thought provoking and funny. It was also a nice break from theology!




Read About Our Accomplished Faith Graduates!

Connor would like to thank Faith Church for its support through his four years, especially for the care packages. He reads from his personalized Bible that Faith Church gave him every day






Casey Hamilton

Casey graduated magna cum laude from the inaugural class of the Rutgers Honors College School of Environmental and Biological Sciences with a degree in Ecology, Evolution, and Natural Resources. He was an Honors College Scholar, a George H. Cook Scholar and a James Dickson Carr Scholar. He also received the Peter E. Smouse Award for the Outstanding Student in Evolution.

This summer, Casey will be interning for the Department of Energy at Brookhaven National Laboratory in the Environmental and Climate Sciences Department. His project is measuring plant physiological and environmental parameters using remote sensing technology to examine plant growth response to drought conditions with the ultimate aim of improving crop breeding and management.

During his senior year, he also wrote and defended his G. H. Cook Honors Thesis titled "Dual" effects of forest fragmentation on forest-associated bees in New Jersey." The project's central findings were that wild bees that rely on forest habitat for survival in New Jersey decline with the loss of forest from a landscape but benefit from the creation of forest edges that accompany deforestation. These findings have implications for the conservation of forest-specialist bees, a group that includes species that provide important pollination services to both wild plants and many of the crops grown in New Jersey. Casey will be presenting this research at the National Conference of the Ecological Society of America in Louisville, Kentucky this August.

Valerie graduated summa cum laude with her Doctor of Pharmacy from Rutgers University in New Brunswick.

She is heading to New Hampshire for a one year residency at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center.





Get Excited! We've Got a New Mission Starting!

The Mission Committee and Session have approved the creation of a mission project here at Faith Church to get food to the local homeless. The plan is to start out by focusing on two areas of need:

- 1. Coordinate with Medford Methodist and Prince of Peace Lutheran to provide meals during the weeks they host homeless families at their churches. Each church hosts once a quarter for one week at a time. Meals are needed for as many as 12 people. There are additional opportunities such as serving the meals, helping school age kids with homework and playing with the young
- 2. Provide fresh and healthy meals-to-go for the Christian Caring Center and St. Vincent de Paul. Both organizations have direct outreach to the homeless and the food-poor. We'll make fresh salads and homemade protein bars, which will be packaged so that both groups can easily distribute them the same day. We'll use HOPE Garden produce when possible.

All this talk of food comes with a POT LUCK PICNIC! Join us after worship on Sunday, June 30 for a pot luck picnic.

- > We'll have details on many ways YOU can help, including: prepping food and delivering food locally.
- You'll get to vote on a name for the mission!
- We'll have a contest to create a logo.
- There will be examples of the food that will be given to people.
- We'll have a "kitchen shower" to collect some of the items needed.
