

### A Message from Pastor Becca

Recently as we gathered at our campfire fellowship, I was struck by just how much love resides in my heart for the people of Faith Presbyterian Church. In those sacred moments, it was the first time I had seen many of your faces in seven months. There were conversations I have missed dearly in our time apart. Now, if you have been following along in worship, you know that when we talk about love biblically it isn't always an emotion or warm fondness but more often an action. Surely what I felt that evening was a little bit of both the emotion and the intentional action of showing up. This led me to thinking about the great privilege I have in being in relationship with each of you as your pastor.

When I was ordained and every time I am installed at a church I answer three questions that talk about love. (If you are a Ruling Elder or Deacon you have answered similar questions too!)

Will you in your own life seek to follow the Lord Jesus Christ, love your neighbors, and work for the reconciliation of the world?

Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love? Will you be active in government and discipline, serving the councils of the church; and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?

These questions are central to my call to ministry being lived out. Often when I am overwhelmed by the day to day tasks of ministry, I pull these out and read them out loud. It helps me to find my center and my focus. I strive for love to be the cornerstone of everything I do. In these past several months I have been using energy, intelligence, and imagination to learn how to better love my neighbors in these pandemic times. I have had to relearn how to love because so many of the ways we have lived love in action in the past are not doable now. I have been reminded repeatedly how central living our faith in community is. While I am grateful for technology that helps us to come together as a community to worship and do the work of the church, I miss you. I often joke with colleagues that I was not prepared to become a televangelist overnight. Preparing for worship is entirely different now, I am thinking about copyright laws for streaming, technology, liturgy, music, the sermon, and even how I apply makeup. While I have become accustomed to preaching to a camera, preaching in an empty sanctuary is a lonely experience. No one comes running in late, no one shuffles papers, there are no children adding to the sounds of worship, I can't hear your voices when we pray together. I already know on the glorious Sunday when I stand at the lectern and see you there that I will be fighting back tears. I long for the day when I can stand at the door offering hugs, handshakes, and high fives. We aren't quite there yet and I know that is frustrating for some of you and a relief for others. In this newsletter you will hear more about that process from our Session.

One of the things I miss the most, is getting to hear about your lives on Sunday mornings, in prayer requests, as we greeted each other, and around the treats in the fellowship area. In these strange days, occasionally I will get an email or phone call, almost always prefaced with, "I am sorry to bother you" accompanying an update. Beloved, your updates are never a bother to me. It is one of the greatest joys of my ministry to get to walk with you on this journey. I want to encourage you to reach out and tell me what is new with you. In the meantime, know that I am praying for each of you and you are loved!

The Kunkle family is thankful that our prayers were answered and Evan was finally able to move into his new apartment quad.






### Turkeys! Turkeys! Turkeys!

## **Session Update**

In preparation for the 2021 Budget, Session discussed plans for a Stewardship Campaign this November. This campaign will include sending out a letter to members, stewardship sermons, and a short video of the church's mission work that will be included in each of the services.

Reopening the church was again discussed. New issues with the pandemic were included in this discussion, such as the rising rate of cases of the virus. Pastor Becca shared with Session what some other churches in the area and in the Presbytery are doing about staying closed or reopening. Concerns were raised about having enough volunteers to greet and if people were to lower their mask any time during the service. No decision to reopen was reached at this time.

For the Advent season, the church is in need of volunteers to schedule a time that they could come in to put up the two Christmas trees behind the podium, the manger, and the tree in the foyer. Volunteers should contact Pastor Becca as soon as possible to schedule an individual work time.

Finally, the Christmas Eve service will be pre-recorded so that people can view the service at their own desired time. Pastor Becca is looking for volunteers to assist her by taping Bible verses either at home or in the sanctuary. Please contact her as soon as possible if you are interested in assisting her for this service.

When my family moved to South Jersey in the late 70s, my parents enrolled me in Small World preschool and soon after decided to join the church, though they had not previously been Presbyterian. I can quite honestly say that growing up at Faith Church had a significant impact on my life. Through the Sunday school classes, the food pantry, and other community outreaches like Trevor's Run in Philadelphia, I met Jesus in a very real and tangible way. Though my life was arguably very sheltered, I learned to see Jesus in those less fortunate and to use my privilege to empower others.

On any given Sunday my mom would be singing in the choir, my dad would be counting the offering after service, and my younger brother would be running around, causing trouble with the other boys. Through the Jr and Sr High youth groups, the retreats down on the Chesapeake Bay, the shore trips and ski trips, I gained a family at Faith that I have carried with me throughout my life, even though we are now all scattered to the wind.

Kate Killebrew was the interim pastor who taught our confirmation class, and I really took both her guidance and the course content deeply to heart. In fact I asked to have a key to the church so that when I went for bike rides, I could come sit in the sanctuary by myself and enjoy the solitude and God's presence. I was also very moved by Christian missionaries who would visit from time to time and talk about what God was doing in other parts of the world, something which clearly has continued to inspire me.

You might be surprised to hear that the governance of the church is something that I still appreciate and hold up as at least a near-gold-standard. Having both men and women equally involved in pastoral ministry, the session, the deacons, and all the other activities of the church was a very good formation for a young girl to experience. I appreciate how all members can rotate through these positions in an effort to avoid hierarchy and instead create a truly shared community. I also didn't realize until I was older just how unique the actual design of the church was. To have the congregants face each other, and to have simple yet powerful symbols of our faith brilliantly incorporated into the architecture and decor was truly a stroke of genius.

I spent five years in a reformed seminary to study scripture more deeply and come to a renewed appreciation of the tradition in which I was raised. I also wrestled a lot with calling and eventually found myself headed for overseas ministry, and have been so thankful for your support over the past decade or so that I have lived and served in Africa and Asia.



I've had a variety of roles during my years overseas, but now my primary focus is what we call EthnoArts, or more simply, local arts.

EthnoArts is... working alongside local artists to:

- · learn about and increase awareness of local arts
- preserve and/or revitalize local artistic traditions
- · create new artistic works

...in order to move the community toward a better future

This work is primarily done through workshops in partnership with local churches. As word gets out, we are invited to hold more workshops in other locations, and often pick up some new facilitators along the way! At a time when globalization brings Western pop culture to the most remote mountaintop villages, it truly is a joy to create a space for locals to rediscover their local arts and traditions and realize that God can speak and move through these art forms in a much more meaningful way than imported hymns, dances, etc.

Otherwise I have been busy reading and reflecting on a lot of issues, especially the issues that are currently plaguing the US, and praying about how we as followers of Jesus are meant to be involved. What happens in the US really affects the whole world, for better or for worse, and I've been thinking a lot about how the US church, or more specifically - white evangelical American Christianity has been exported worldwide. I'm not always sure this is a good thing, to be honest with you.

As the church we have an essential role in this. We are called to be the hands and feet of Jesus, yet it seems more and more as though we have forgotten this calling and have long been complicit in the injustices that have been perpetrated - not only throughout history, but even today. This greatly saddens me, but I do think it's important to face these issues rather than pretend that they don't exist. They won't go away on their own.
