All About Ash Wednesday - February 10, 2016

Q: Excuse me, but why do you have dirt on your forehead?

A: Ash Wednesday is the day many Christians mark as the first day of Lent, the time of reflection and penitence leading up to Easter Sunday. Clergy all over the world dispense ashes, usually made by burning the palm fronds distributed on last year's Palm Sunday, making the sign of the cross on the bowed foreheads before them. As they "impose" or "dispense" the ashes, the pastor or priest reminds each Christian of Genesis 3:19: "For dust you are and to dust you shall return."

Q: Well, that's cheerful. Why would anyone want to start a workday on such a downer?

A: It isn't intended to be a downer. It's a reminder that our lives are short and we must live them to the fullest. Maybe it's a little bit of a downer. But there's a big party the night before Ash Wednesday. That's Mardi Gras or "Fat Tuesday," a secular observance that evolved out of "Shrove Tuesday," often marked by eating pancakes or other sweet foods – before the solemnity and penance of Lent set in.

Q: OK, so don't invite me over for dinner until Lent is over in 40 days.

A: Fun fact: Lent is actually longer than 40 days. There are 46 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter but most churches don't count the Sundays as part of Lent.

Q: I thought only Catholics marked Ash Wednesday?

A: Not anymore. It used to be true that Catholics were the majority of people celebrating Ash Wednesday. But today, most "liturgical churches" (those with a regular, calendar-based set of rituals and observances) mark the day, including Methodists, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, and Lutherans. Most evangelical and Pentecostal Christians don't observe the day and neither do Mormons.

Q: I don't remember reading about Ash Wednesday in the Bible. Where did the practice come from?

A: That's true. There is no mention of Ash Wednesday in the Bible. But there is a tradition of ashes as a sign of penitence that predates Jesus. In the Old Testament, Job repents "in dust and ashes," and there are other associations of ashes and repentance in Esther, Samuel, Isaiah and Jeremiah. By the 10th century, the monk Aelfric tied the practice to the period before Easter, writing, "Now let us do this little at the beginning of our Lent that we strew ashes upon our heads to signify that we ought to repent of our sins during the Lenten fast." By the 11th century, the practice was widespread throughout the church until Martin Luther threw the practice out in the 16th century because it was not biblically based. There's no Lent in the Bible though many Christians see it as an imitation of the 40 days Jesus spent fasting and battling with Satan in the desert.

Q: When can you wash the dirt off your face?

A: No one is required to keep the ashes on his or her face after the ritual. Some Christians choose to, as a reminder to themselves that they are mortal and fallible, while others may choose to leave them on as a witness to their faith in the hope others will ask about them and open a door to sharing their faith.

Discovering God's Plan for Our Future

We continue to make progress on the mission study and report, which is a prerequisite to beginning the search for a new pastor. The following outline describes the steps that need to be taken and where we are so far:

- Pray for God's Blessing and Guidance
 - What is our Biblical and Theological understanding?
 - We are starting with "What We Believe" (Church Website)
- Collect Internal (FUPC) Data
 - Financial and Logistical (we have 10 years of data)
 - ➤ History of FUPC (collecting currently)
 - Description of Staff and Facilities
 - Current mission and programs
- Collect External Data (Surrounding Community, 10 mile radius)
 - Profile of the Community (we are 80% complete)
- Consider Comparison between our Congregation and the Community
- Survey the Congregation
 - Some different methods can be:
 - Traditional Survey, multi question (completed a short one)
 - Group Discussions
 - Individual Interviews
 - Pot Luck working session (one completed, 2nd on 2/14/16)
- Reflect on the Gathered Data to Discern our Opportunities and Challenges
- Provide Report (Data & Initial Reactions) to help guide the Pastor Nominating Committee

During the Pot Luck on 2/14, we will be giving an update on the data collected so far, and we will survey the congregation using a variant of the following three questions:

- 1. Is there anything you observed in the data that could help inform our mission?
- 2. What qualities do we need in a minister to further the mission of our church?
- 3. Imagine it is the year 2020, what does Faith Church look like?

Thank you for your prayers, interest and involvement in this discernment process. We need as many people as possible to participate to help assure God's plan will be revealed.
